106 youth graduate from Construction Technology and Carpentry Training

On Saturday, 106 youth graduated from Construction Technology and Carpentry Training facilitated by Habitat for Humanity and sponsored by the Scotiabank Foundation.

The Construction Technology Programme provides training sessions from basic in masonry geared towards grass-root builders to an extensive six-week certified course. The certified course is a combination of a theory and practice where all core areas of construction are covered. The Youth Carpentry Training is a hands-on programme, facilitated to engage unemployed youth. It is a hands-on workshop, with the teams encouraged to work together to produce useable pieces of furniture. Participants are trained on how to build home furniture with accessible materials and share their experiences and acquired knowledge with other people in their community.

The Hon. Adrian Leonce – Minister in the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development told the graduates that they have a big role to play in the future of the nation. "Building good character and building good skillsets are what we need to build a good nation...The seeds that have been planted, thanks to Scotiabank and Habitat for Humanity, take those seeds and nurture them and let the fruit of those seeds be a better Trinidad and Tobago
